EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The year began on uncertain ground with builders' contributions and the receipts from our largest fundraiser - the 2009 Mumbai Marathon- were significantly lower than previous years'. Moreover, we were not sure how long some of the centres would run or if we would be able to open more centres this year. Fortunately, we had two new, substantial and long-term institutional funders on board - the EdelGive Foundation and the British Asian Trust and their support brought the promise of putting us on firm ground again. We decided to focus on institutional strengthening - ranging from improving administrative systems to investing in upgrading our primary programme.

By the third quarter of the year, things were pretty much back on track and builders were reopening centres and willing to support children on their sites. The 2010 Mumbai Marathon raised adequate funds and nearly 300 people ran for our cause. As this report shows, we closed the year reaching almost the same number of children as the last. Moreover, we added several new administrative systems which improved efficiency, went through a rigorous process to enlist on GiveIndia, a web based organisation that promotes organisations with the highest standards of accountability and transparency, developed an entire new curriculum for our primary programme and commissioned an extensive evaluation of our work.

One achievement we would like to highlight is that now 42% of our teaching staff comprises women who live on construction sites whom we have trained as teachers. Their inclusion in our programme is both a source of pride (for them as well as us) and a challenge, as they bring new perspectives to our work. Their federation - Sakhi - is discussed in our Advocacy section, and they have inspired us to gradually explore how to support other issues, especially those related to the lack of identity that construction workers face. Towards this end, in early 2010, we hired a Research and Advocacy Officer and sought funding to pilot a one year study on this issue. This is an entirely new area for us.

At the end of the year, the Right to Education became a fundamental right - a long awaited and extremely important initiative by the Government of India. Unfortunately, children below six years of age were left out of the purview of this law, and our struggle to represent their needs must continue. However, we are keen to ensure that children between six and fourteen years of age who live on sites are assured their fundamental rights, and with this end in view, we have worked with several groups to highlight the special needs of migrant children.

The year to come will hopefully not only see our centres increase but also enable us to spread our wings to other socio-economic groups and train other organisations that support migrant workers' children. Our advocacy efforts will also be directed towards helping the Sakhi Federation articulate its goals and supporting the enrolment in local municipal schools of children on construction sites.

It has been an enormously rewarding experience serving as the CEO of Mumbai Mobile Creches. In March 2010 I joined the Board of Directors and my very capable colleague Vrishali Pispati is now the CEO of MMC. We are extremely fortunate to have her in this key position and I wish her every success.

I thank the Board of Directors and all my colleagues at MMC for their support, guidance and inspiration.




THE MUMBAI MOBILE CRECHES PROGRAMME

a. Number of Children Reached

In 2009-2010, Mumbai Mobile Creches reached a total of 5452 children through 31 centres. There are an almost equal number of girls and boys across all age groups in the centres.









While we reached 5452 children through the year, there are far fewer children at any given point of time. As the table below shows, the large majority of children spend about three months at a centre before moving to the next site, and the average varies from month to month. Moreover, children speak many different languages when they first arrive at our centres—we had children from 14 states, the top 10 of which are illustrated in a chart below. Naturally this makes designing a curriculum, especially for children of school going age, very challenging.

Over 40% of the children come from various parts of Maharashtra. Interestingly, 85% of them came from the drought prone regions of Vidarbha and Marathwada. Washim, Yavatmal, Akola, Parbhani and Beed were the main districts that saw migration to the construction sector from Maharashtra. Marginal landholding and severe drought force the population in these regions, comprising largely of tribals, to migrate as unskilled labourers on construction sites. Over 95% of migrants from West Bengal come from Murshidabad region. The maximum migration from Bihar happens from the Samastipur region and from Karnataka happens in the Gulbarga district on the sites in which we have centres.







b. Strengthening the Education Programme

This year we received a generous grant from the Bombay Community Public Trust, which was supported by the Sir Ratan Tata Trust, to improve reading in our centres. This allowed us to provide over 200 books per centre. Our recently hired Education Coordinator also worked with teachers to consciously promote reading. Now, every afternoon at 12.15, there is pin drop silence as everyone is instructed (visitors included!) to Drop Everything and Read. Children who do not recognise alphabets are encouraged to picture read. In fact, this worked so well that parents with children in our crèche section are now requested to come in and picture read to their children once a week.

In MMC our main expertise lies in supporting the below sixes, and our new Primary Education Coordinator had to simultaneously focus on many matters--teacher training, curriculum strengthening and extensive resource material development. In fact, our cost of per capita per month educational material trebled from Rs. 8 to Rs. 25! We closed the year with tailored worksheets, work cards and materials for three levels of ability in both Hindi as well as Marathi.

A growing challenge in the primary programme has been the demand for English. We were extremely fortunate to have Mumbai Connexions and Sarah Drysdale hold a weekly English class at one of our centres. It has been enormously successful and we hope to be able to expand this initiative to more centres in the coming year.

c. Enrolment of children in municipal schools

In the past year, 524 children have been assisted to enrol in their neighbourhood municipal schools – this is up by 30% reflecting our drive to ensure that more children get mainstreamed. This is part of the Sarva Shikshan Abhiyaan, the Central Government's 'Education for All' campaign. Children in our non-formal education programme are coached to qualify to enter the municipal school system, learning the basics of reading, writing and mathematics. Once children are enrolled, we do our best to support them in their studies. In this past year we supported over a thousand children with extra tuitions through our after/before school classes. Seventy other children across 12 centres were given stipends and scholarships to continue higher education.

In April 2010, the government made education a fundamental right for all children between six and fourteen. We will now be actively engaged in ensuring that migrant children are not left out in the implementation of this law.

Eight year old Nisha Jadhav is tall for her age. She lives with her parents and three younger siblings fairly close to a centre. As both her parents work, Nisha sometimes has to look after her younger siblings. According to Nisha, they do not trouble her; indeed, they listen to her more than they do to their mother! Nisha's father is a carpenter and her mother works as a household help. The family's monthly income is about Rs.5, 000.

When Nisha first joined our Patilipada centre she didn't know how to read or write. But she's a quick learner, and in May 2009, we helped her get into municipal school. She's now in the second standard

d. Field Trips and Outings

As part of the learning process, our children are taken on a number of educational outings throughout the year. Very often these field trips are related to subjects being taught and include visits to the market to learn about vegetables and fruits, to bus stops to examine different kinds of transport, to a neighbouring garden to look at leaves and flowers. Often our corporate friends not only sponsor these trips but accompany the children too.


Here's a sampler of the monthly calendar of outings this year:

- April 20 children from two centres visited the **HSBC** office at Malad and participated in a musical programme with their staff.
- May 15 children from Ganesh Nagar centre spent a day at Essel World.
- June –20 employees of **Convergys** organised a fair for 130 children from our Patlipada centre in a nearby garden. There was much dancing and celebration, especially when the employees treated the children to lots of new toys!
- July A partner NGO, **Magic Bus**, organised a picnic for 26 children from our Patlipada centre to the waterfalls at Tungareshwar.
- August For the second year in a row, the Neptune group of builders organised a
 celebration for the Ganesh festival. 560 children from 19 centres attended the event.
 The Neptune Group had organised food, gifts, a magic show, music and even a DJ!.
 Mr. Sachin Deshmukh from Neptune Group and Mr. Nawab Malik, Labour Minister
 were the Chief guests for the event.
- September 11 children visited the Smile Fun School in Powai (Rambaugh) and shared their monthly theme songs and activities with the children there.
- October 30 children from our Cottongreen centre participated in a workshop on creating silverware art which was held at **Bhau Daji Lad Museum**.
- November 30 children from our Cottongreen centre went to the Rambo Circus.
 This was sponsored by our long term supporters, Concern India Foundation.
- December- Our annual children's camp was held at Marve and 463 children from across all our centres enjoyed two days of non-stop fun and games!
- January Thanks to ACC Ahead volunteers, 57 children from Patlipada centre visited the **Tiku-ji-ni-wadi resort in Thane**.
- February 30 children from Agripada visited the **Fazlani L'Académie Globale** as part of our ongoing Child-to-Child program and taught Warli painting to 42 children there.
- March 25 children from Pratiksha Nagar centre participated in the Child-to-child session held at the American School of Bombay.

II. HEALTH AND NUTRITION PROGRAMME

While our health and nutrition programme focuses on preventative health, every week doctors visit centres to do checkups and provide medication. We also facilitate visits from the neighbouring health centres to ensure that children are immunised.

We found that 70% of children suffer from various vitamin deficiencies, even though they're not underweight. This is worrying because such deficiencies can have serious consequences. The deficiencies we identified and treated are mentioned in the graph below. Over 60% of the children suffered from Iron and Vitamin-B deficiency.



Those children who were underweight were given dietary supplements such as Raagi (an Iron and Calcium rich cereal) and eggs. Thanks to this, those up to the age of 3 gained, on average, a kilo in 3 months, while the older kids gained a kilo in 2.5 months. Children who stayed at the centres for more than six months saw an average weight gain of over 2.5 kg. An independent study, which we describe in the advocacy section, has confirmed that the health of almost all the children improved after they'd attended a centre for a few months.

Finally, with support from partner NGO Ummeed, we now have a fully trained Special Needs Coordinator, Rajkumari Jadav. One of our community teachers, Rajkumari was awarded a fellowship and was trained for six months in developmental milestones of differently-abled children. She rejoined our team in September and coordinates all our work with children who have special health and other needs. She visits centres regularly, coordinates with hospitals and their social work departments, counsels parents, and supports those teachers who work with these children.

Happy Feet!

One-and-a-half year old Swaraj is a happy and playful child. However, he was born with bilateral club feet. He could not walk and could barely crawl to his mother sitting less than a foot away. When Swaraj came to our centre at HCC Powai, our teachers immediately informed us about his medical problem. Our field officer, Rajkumari, accompanied the family on several rounds of doctor visits and consultations. Finally this month Swaraj was operated on his right foot at KEM hospital. Doctors are going to wait a while before they operate on his left foot. We hope Swaraj has a speedy recovery and lives the childhood he truly deserves.

Special thanks to Dr. Asha Chakraborty and our panel of doctors (Dr. Joglekar, Dr. (Mrs.) Joglekar, Dr. Suri, Dr. Purandare, Dr. Patil, Dr. Mulye, Dr. Kavatkar, Dr. Agashe and Dr. Takkar) who continue for several decades to give us essential support in our health care programme.

III. COMMUNITY OUTREACH

a. Chai Pani meetings

"Come have some tea and biscuits this afternoon. We are having a monthly meeting and everyone's invited," says the teacher to parents as they drop their children off at the centre. At the appointed time, women come in ones and twos. Sometimes, they are brought by their children, eager to make sure that their parents don't miss out.

This is how a **chai-pani** monthly meeting at a Mumbai Mobile Creches centre begins. Every month a different site-specific issue is discussed and parents are given important information. About 400-500 parents attend these meetings every month.

b. Open Days

Open days are parent-teacher meetings held once every three months for every section of every centre. There are one-on-one discussions on every child's progress and parents are shown their children's academic and artistic achievements About 400 parents attend these meetings becoming aware of their children's learning experiences.

c. Lokdoots

'Lokdoot' or street theatre programmes on a variety of issues, are regularly performed at Mumbai Mobile Creches sites, usually in the evenings. These lead to discussions on various issues that affect workers and children on the site. Five Lokdoots were performed last year and 660 men, women and children living on construction sites were reached

ADVOCACY

a. Empowering Communities

While we have been working closely with parents to promote better child care practices for the last few decades, in 2007 we began to focus on supporting women who lived on construction sites to become teachers. We hoped that as their confidence (and numbers) increased, they would initiate and run centres themselves. We are very proud to report that currently 42% of our teaching staff are women from sites. For most, it is not only an enormous self esteem booster; it also changes their standing in their communities. They become respected leaders and set examples for other young women in their area to follow suit. Every year, we train about 25 women from sites.

In April 2009, at a monthly meeting, the women became nostalgic and recalled their association and time spent with each other during their training period. They shared their experiences--including an incident when they collectively protected their friends from police harassment. They also decided to create a federation, which they named 'Sakhi', Hindi for close female friend. Although they were especially keen to help people in their communities open bank accounts (we had assisted all of them to open accounts the previous year) it proved to be very difficult because banks had tightened their rules, making it impossible for construction workers with no proof of their identity to open accounts. However, Sakhi continue to meet and its members are currently in the process of forming two self help groups. They want to start saving and, hopefully, start their own enterprises one day.

Sakhi's monthly discussions have also prompted us to become part of a network working on migrant workers' rights and issues and to seek funding from the Sir Dorabji Tata Trust to conduct a detailed study on construction workers in the coming year. We hope that the study will throw light on how and what forms of identity construction workers and their families can obtain to access cheaper food grains, banking services and insurance schemes.

b. Builders

While at the beginning of the year, builders' contributions had fallen nearly 10%, by the middle of the year, construction was back in full swing, and we closed the year with contributions returning to the previous year's level. However, the number of children is slightly lower (although we ran more centres this year than last) because it took a long time to open centres.

c. Government

A one year report was prepared by Bhavishya Alliance for the Commissioner of the Integrated Child Development Service (ICDS) to present the impact of the MMC-ICDS partnership to run day care centres on three construction sites. In one year alone, over 1000 children under six years of age were supported across three sites. Moreover, analysis revealed that 60% of the children who entered the centre showed improvement in their nutritional status. In addition, there was a 50% decline in malnourishment after entering the centre. These are significant findings that should spur the ICDS to set up centres on more construction sites. Alas, progress on this front is slow. It's something we need to keep pushing for.

d. Civil Society

After having worked in the field of early childhood education for forty years, and developed an enormous resource base, an important part of our advocacy includes training and support services to individuals, organisations, government and academic institutions in the child rights field. This year the following trainings/workshops were conducted:

- Over 200 students across fifteen different education institutions in the city completed internships in our centres.
- Over 1000 people, including children, students of education, preschool and municipal school teachers benefited from twenty one workshops on teaching aids (most of these were on how to use puppets as low-cost yet effective learning aids).

We are also involved in city-wide campaigns and coalitions with NGO partners on issues of child labour, education and health. Significant engagements this year include:

Bhavishya Alliance (BA)

Set up to combat child malnourishment in the state, Bhavishya Alliance has become a key partner and has been central to our successes with local administrators of ICDS. BA partly funds the ICDS centres and also supports all discussions and advocacy with the government. • <u>Balamandir Research Foundation and National Network on Information on Parenting</u> (NIP)

In an effort to spread positive parenting messages and measure the impact of our work, in association with the Bala Mandir Research Foundation in Chennai (we are all part of a National Network on Information on Parenting) we commenced a three year tracer study on the 'Learning Through Play' calendar. Five centres are participating in this research study which includes all crèche and balwadi children.

Network on Migration and Child Rights

MMC is part of a group of NGOs that hosted a Migration and Child Rights conference in Pune. A concept paper (written in partnership with Tara Mobile Creches in Pune and Nirman) on the special needs of children on construction sites was presented.

Ummeed

An NGO working with children with special needs, this year Ummeed trained one of our community teachers to become our full-time Special Needs Coordinator.

• <u>Child-to-Child Programme</u>

Coordinated very successfully by Robin Age children's newspaper (which won an award for excellence this year) the Child-to-Child programme brings together children from elite city schools in the city such as École Mondiale World School, American School of Bombay and Fazlani L'Académie Globale and from our centres to share their learning and teach each other different skills. This year, we also had the elementary school of the United World College in Singapore (a long term friend) and children from the St. Nicolas School in England organise fundraising drives in their schools for MMC children.

In the coming year, we will be working closely with the Association for Early Childhood Education and Development to find out the quality and scope of crèche services available in

select low income communities and to train local women to run crèches. We will also be working with various organisations supported by the Sir Dorabji Tata Trust that are working with migrant workers issues to conduct a detailed study of construction workers and their access to their entitlements.

ORGANISATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

a. Institutional Strengthening Initiatives

- We are now registered with GiveIndia, a donation platform that hosts organisations that have been scrutinised for transparency and accountability. We are also registered on GuideStar India, a UK based organisation, that accredits and rates NGOs based on their accountability.
- A YouTube page (<u>www.youtube.com/mumbaimobilecreches</u>) was created to spread awareness about our cause.
- EdelGive Foundation developed a salary software programme that has significantly improved our administrative efficiency.
- Tata Consultancy Services developed donor management software that allows us to better track and communicate with donors.
- We hired an Advocacy Officer to help consolidate and build our efforts in this area.

- A puppet show to spread messages and awareness on MMC was developed. New large puppets were created and a short film is available on the website.
- A MMC song to spread awareness was created. It has been uploaded on the website.
- The MMC office was renovated thanks to the generous support of office equipment by Edelweiss Capital.
- Vrinda Duttta began her three month evaluation study of MMC in January' 10.
